MGT 382.A11: Production / Operations Management (POM)

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Course Description

In this course, students will analyze production and service operations systems and their relationship with all other functions and activities in the organization. Deterministic and probabilistic models will be used to support decision-making.

Class Objectives

Through study, analysis, and research, we will develop an understanding of the major elements of production and operations management; the responsibilities of production/operations managers; and the methods and approaches needed for achieving effective management of the POM function.
